I'M A SCIENTIST I 4-H K-12 PROGRAMS

Over the past decade, America has started to understand the magnitude of its dropout epidemic and take important steps to measure and address it. Educators, administrators, community leaders, policy makers, social entrepreneurs, students, parents, and others have been active at the school, state, and national levels to ensure dropout prevention and recovery and college readiness are part of a comprehensive educational improvement strategy tailored to local conditions. Most future dropouts begin to disengage from school during early adolescence, and during the middle grades achievement gaps often grow. By the time these students enter high school, they have one foot out the door and are not prepared to succeed in a rigorous college and career-readiness high school curriculum.

According to the National Center for Education Statistics, 66 percent of girls in fourth grade say they like science. But only one-third of high school students enrolled in Advanced Placement physics classes are girls. At the college level, fewer than one-fifth of engineering majors are women. Positive reinforcement in these subjects can give all youth the extra support they need to enthusiastically pursue STEM (science, technology, engineering and math) careers.

LET'S G0 **CAMPING**

At three NC 4-H camps and conference centers spread out across the state, youth can participate in everything from sailing near the

coast to negotiating ropes courses in the foothills.

Programs range from traditional camp activities such as swimming and horseback riding to environmental education and creative writing. They're tailored for youth ages 5 to 17. And recent sweeping renovations to all of the camps include major structural upgrades and new facilities. All of our 4-H camps are accredited by the American Camp Association (ACA), a national organization that sets high standards for the health and safety of campers and staff and the delivery of quality programs.

In 2013, 3,879 youth participated in 10 weeks of camp.

4-H'ers: COLLEGE BOUND

In 2013, students from across the state received 4-H scholarships from the North Carolina 4-H Foundation to attend institutions of higher learning. The total amount of 4-H scholarships awarded this year, including renewable scholarships, amounts to more than \$100,000.
